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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In the areas we audited, Port operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The Port also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Port of Pasco from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Port's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- General disbursements
- Change orders
- Contract monitoring
- Debt limitations
- Backup and recovery for critical systems and data
- Leasing activity
- Self-insurance: unemployment

We evaluated internal controls and tested compliance with the federal program requirements, as applicable, for the Port's major federal program, which is listed in the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs section of the separate financial statement and single audit report. INFORMATION ABOUT THE PORT

The Port of Pasco is a local municipal corporation formed by the voters inhabiting approximately 80% of Franklin County in 1940. The Port Commission, the governing body, is made up of three local residents who are elected to a six-year term, with one of the nonpartisan positions up for election every two years. The Port's primary mission is economic development for the citizens of the district. In accordance with the laws of Washington, the Commissioners have appointed an Executive Director to manage Port operations, and a Port Finance Director to manage the Port's finances.

The Port is organized to provide and operate marine terminals, airports and industrial properties. Major facilities owned and operated by the Port include: Big Pasco Industrial Park, which consists of 1.5 million square-foot of industrial buildings, located on 600 acres of waterfront land for manufacturing, warehousing, distribution and assembly plant locations. A Marine Terminal located on 28 acres, which handles one of the largest bulk cargo barge tonnage on the Columbia River above the Portland and Vancouver districts. Tri-Cities Airport, which is the regional air carrier airport. Its 1,800 acres of land is available for industrial development with some building space available for rent. Pasco Processing Center is owned and developed by the Port of Pasco. Total operating revenues in 2016 were \$9,980,975 and operating expenditures were \$13,855,637.
